Identity of CCR:

The Holy Spirit brings our faith to life

Faith, hope and charity are theological virtues "infused by God into the souls of the faithful to make them capable of acting as his children... They are the

pledge of the presence and action of the Holy Spirit in the faculties of the human being." (CCC № 1813) Faith is, therefore, a gift. It is a work of the Holy Spirit in us if we open ourselves to His grace.

Faith, which is the assurance of "the blessings that we hope for, or prove the existence of realities that are unseen" (Heb 11:1), is necessary for salvation: "Whoever believes and is baptised will be saved; whoever does not believe will be condemned" (Mk 16:16). In addition, Paul tells us that "anyone who is upright through faith will live" (Rom 1:17) and the Church's Magisterium says, "faith is the beginning of human salvation, the foundation and root of all justification" (Council of Trent, c. VIII).

However, we can see in present-day man a cooling down of faith, a distancing from God and His love. This is evident in the prevailing greed and in the organisation of many societies. Their parliaments pass laws contrary to what God asks of us in Scripture. One example is the legalisation of abortion. The Year of Faith proclaimed by Pope Benedict XVI in his Apostolic Letter Porta fidei is crucial in our time.

Today as in the past, Paul's words resonate strongly in all of us in the Church: Woe to me if I do not preach the gospel! (cf. 1 Cor 9:16) "But it is in that way faith comes, from hearing, and that means hearing the word of Christ." (Rom 10:17) By faith, we believe and joyfully receive Christ and his Good News. We announce Him without fear because faith is to believe with the heart

> and to declare with the lips (cf. Rom 10:10).

> We come to faith through the powerful work of the Holy Spirit acting in and through us. He operates in us by immersing us in Him, baptising us with fire, sanctifying us, and letting

us know that Jesus Christ is Lord and that He is alive. He tells us that God is love and that He loves



us. The Holy Spirit works in us by revealing the Scriptures (cf. Jn 14:26, Jn 16:13). He works in us through prayer, interceding for us in accordance with God's will (cf. Rom 8:26-27). He acts in us in the Eucharist, which makes present the body and blood of Christ. He reassures us that the host is truly the Lord's body.

The Holy Spirit works through us by making us ambassadors of Christ and proclaiming his Word to all the nations (cf. Acts 1:8). Like the apostles after Pentecost, the Holy Spirit continues to compel the disciples of Christ to declare that Jesus is Lord! (cf. 1 Cor 12:3) Jesus is risen and is alive! He gives us an abundant life (cf. Jn 10:10) that the world, far from God, does not know. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church says, "The disciple of Christ must not only keep the faith and live on it, but also profess it, confidently bear witness to it, and spread it" (CCC № 1816). Moreover, He makes us realise that in Jesus is life itself.

Faith opens us to all the riches of God. It is the salt that gives flavour to life. "Faith grows when it is lived as an experience of love received and when it is communicated as an experience of grace and joy." (Porta fidei).

Jesus brought salvation—abundant, eternal life—to every person who gives his life back to God and accepts to be born from above (cf. Jn 3:3). This comes to pass when we believe in response to the grace of faith planted and nurtured by the Holy Spirit.

The New Evangelisation for the Transmission of the Christian Faith

In 1983, Pope John Paul II began to refer to a "new evangelisation." Since then, there has been a growing focus on the need for a "new evangelisation."

Benedict XVI underlined this need by establishing the first new Vatican department in many years, the Pontifical Council for the Promotion of the New Evangelisation, and then calling for the world Synod of Bishops to focus on the new evangelisation. Two hundred and sixty two Synod Fathers, 44 experts (I was one of these), and 49 observers gathered for three weeks to share observations on the state of the Church all over the world and to suggest ways in which a new evangelisation could contribute to the strengthening of the Church in light of the challenges it is facing.

Evangelisation and New Evangelisation

Since Vatican II, documents on evangelisation have been remarkably consistent in insisting on the priority of direct proclamation with a view toward conversion. Paul VI made this point strongly in *Evangelii nuntiandi*: "Evangelisation will also always contain—as the foundation, centre, and at the same time, summit of its dynamism—a clear proclamation that, in Jesus Christ, the Son of God made man, who died and rose from the dead, salvation is offered to all men, as a gift of God's grace and mercy" (27).

On new evangelisation, John Paul II made it clear that he wasn't calling for a new gospel, but for a new effort, characterised by new "ardour, methods, and expression," and directed in a new way, not only to those who have never heard the gospel before, but also to the lukewarm and de-Christianised traditionally Christian Western nations. The new evangelisation is new in to whom it is addressed and in who does it—every baptised Catholic. Even if a layperson's primary field of mission is in the political, economic or social sphere or in doing works of charity, he or she continues to have an obligation to directly proclaim Christ by word, with a view towards leading others to conversion or deeper faith.

Wake-up call

The Catholic Church is experiencing the collapse of Christian society as a "wake-up call" to the need for a renewal of fervour, both for holiness and for evangelisation, rooted in the continuing reality of Pentecost. I think the most significant good that will come out of the Synod for many years to come is that the whole Church will commit herself to an emphasis on a new evangelisation, which, she hopes, will bring many people back to the Church and many souls to Christ. For this to happen, a "new Pentecost" is needed, appropriated on a personal level. Even for those whom people consider "devout" Catholics, a real conversion is needed. They must not just see themselves as concerned with their own holiness and works of Christian service. They must be consumed with a passion to share Christ with others.

Denise Bergeron has been a member of the Covenant Centre of Prayer since 1976. When she was about 17, after living a powerful personal experience of the living Lord while at a prayer

group, she felt the desire to follow Jesus and His Church more fully. This marvellous experience of the baptism in the Spirit moved her deeply and gave her a new dynamism. After several weekends of renewal and a short stay at the Covenant Centre of Prayer (Centre de prière l'Alliance) in Trois-Rivières, this call became more pressing. After a three-year formation, she committed herself to the Lord in this Community.

Denise was a member of the Association of Delegates of the Charismatic Renewal for more than ten years and has been a member of the Canadian Council of the CR for several years. She evangelises through teaching and training to the charismatic life (Life in the Spirit Seminars), as well as animating groups. She also participates in the organisation of conferences. She is particularly involved in the ministry of inner healing through sessions of Christotherapy conducted at the Covenant Centre of Prayer. Her experience at the Covenant led her to give sessions in Canada, Boston, New York, Guadeloupe, Martinique and France.

ECCLA 2012 in Paraguay

The XXV Latin American Catholic Charismatic Meeting (ECCLA in Spanish) took place from 13 to 20 October 2012 in Asunción, Paraguay. It was attended by more than 800 people from 22 countries. They experienced the new Pentecost in the Upper Room in the fire of the Holy Spirit. The inspired preaching, worship songs, and fervent charismatic prayer around Jesus' Eucharist and the love of Mary, produced a dramatic growth in brotherly love. Those blessed days led to major agreements, which will undoubtedly be of great benefit to the commemoration of 50 years of the CCR in the world. The Lord, who always gives more than we expect, also allowed attendees to have important signs, like the relics of Blessed Elena Guerra. She was a forerunner of this new Pentecost. Organisers took from one of her letters the motto of the meeting: "We need to go back to the Spirit so He comes back to us." Participants were built up by recalling during the event the life of a true faithful servant, Fr Emiliano Tardiff. The stole used by him the day he was called by our Lord to the New Jerusalem was exhibited. Attendees could only exclaim: thank you, Lord, for such wonders!

Leaders from different national charismatic realities gather together in the US

A Gathering of National Leadership Groups in the United States was held on 14-16 January 2013 in Manresa Retreat House in Miami (Florida). A total of 40 leaders representing the National Leadership Groups of the CCR attended the event. The Leadership Groups are composed of the Alliance of Filipino Catholic Charismatic Prayer Communities, Association of Diocesan Liaisons to the Catholic Charismatic Renewal, Catholic Fraternity of Charismatic Covenant Communities and Fellowships, Comité Nacional de Servicio Hispano, Le Conseil du Renouveau Charismatique Catholique des Haïtiens d'Outre-Mer, and the National Service Committee. One of the topics discussed during the meeting was the five-year preparation for the 50th Anniversary Jubilee of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal in 2017, in union with the plan of ICCRS. A proposal was also made in fostering the Baptism in the Holy Spirit through a Covenant of Understanding, which was tabled for further discussions among the groups.
