Questions to the ICCRS Doctrinal Commission:

IS IT PERMISSIBLE TO GET A TATTOO?

Catholic tradition teaches us that God longs to continually communicate with us. The Church states that He does this in three basic ways:

creation, the voice of our conscience, and Sacred Scripture. God is always striving to get the attention of every human being. A couple of questions we can ask ourselves are, "How do I communicate with God?" and "Do I use the means at my disposal for this purpose?"

A prayer journal can be a fruitful tool to assist a praying person with this personal God communication (prayer). St Ignatius of Loyola (Spiritual Exercises) and St Thérèse of Lisieux (The Story of a Soul) are two of the many saints who have used this tool to record their interior lives. Millions have benefitted from their written recordings. The revelations of their interior lives have inspired a multitude of Christians.

A prayer journal is not a chronological diary of prayer with a particular written form. It is not a theological thesis, nor does it need to be grammatically correct. Put simply, it is an interior dialogue of prayer, captured on paper, between the writer and God. A conversation between one heart and another. This journal can record great joy and equally deep sorrow. It can use many words or very few. It can be poetic or chaotic. There can be times in our spiritual journey when it seems as though we are the ones doing all the talking. God is silent. Recording our prayer experiences during these times can reveal the "still silent voice of God."

The Information technology highway in today's world gives us answers at the touch of a button. Our minds can be entertained through many different media and this has affected our prayer communication with God. We are becoming "surface dwellers" with no time to journey towards depth and mystery. With little hesitation, we can jump from one "thought" (or Scripture

verse) to another. We are losing the ability to wait patiently, to go deeper. Due to this inability, it is becoming rare to "taste" our prayer experiences (or lack thereof) with God. We no longer savour prayer's full flavour or give it adequate time to reveal the full message contained within its depths.

We can experience God's presence during our prayer time in a very powerful way yet within a matter of hours or days, we can easily forget this encounter. However, if we record our experience in a prayer journal, it brings us back to that experience and gives the Holy Spirit space to work with deeper revelation. A prayer journal helps us to remain focused on such an experience, particular theme, or subject and assist us greatly in bringing us back to any "unfinished" business.

A prayer journal can be a very powerful tool when dealing with past hurts. These hurts and emotions can be so deeply hidden within us that it is difficult to get in touch with them and almost impossible to express them through the spoken word. Our journal can be our best friend where we can record, through the written word, the powerful emotions welling within us. We can use our recordings to safely confront ourselves, our aggressors, or God Himself. Through these recollections, we have the ability to see paths of Grace, paths of weakness, and the Hand of God at work in our lives.

God desires a living, close relationship with all His people. He constantly invites us to draw deeper into the mystery of who He is and the depth of His love for us. We must deepen our prayer connection if we are to experience the fullness of life that God is offering to us. Praying the same way now as we did a couple of years ago would indicate that we might not be completely open to the Grace God offers to deepen our relationship with Him. A prayer journal is one way to turn this around.

TRUSTING IN THE ACTION OF GOD

"We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose" (Rom 8:28). When we talk about growing in spirituality, it is not so much about doing the extraordinary, but

more about trusting in the promises of the Lord. The dictionary gives the definition of the word trust as, firm belief in the honesty, veracity and strength of a person; confident expectation; total reliance; etc. Trust is the confidence that Jesus is big enough, strong enough, and caring enough to ensure what is good for us despite a temporary phase of uncertainty. Yes, I may believe that Jesus is bigger than the problems, but I really don't think that it is true in this case. There is a big chasm between the "yes" and the "but." Only trust can bridge the gap. Trust is a tiny key that can unlock the grace that will affirm that Jesus is bigger than any uncertainties. It makes us confident that we can rely on Him.

I would like to share a testimony where I individually and the Catholic Charismatic Renewal in New Delhi in India as a body—trusted in the action of God. On 8 July 1996, during my personal prayer, I had a vision of a huge building. I was filled with awe and enquired from the Lord what the vision meant. I received a strong confirmation in prayer that the Lord wanted us to establish a renewal centre in Delhi. Although I was Chairman of the Archdiocesan Service Team of the CCR then, I did not dare to share this message with the members of the Service Team, because we did not have even a bank account at that time to fund such a centre. The only thing I did was that I started praying for it and asked our intercession ministry to pray for the same. We have the assurance, "Whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours" (Mk 11:24). My faith was not strong enough to really believe that such an incredible thing would eventually happen.

However, in 1999, while the Service Team met with Archbishop Alan de Lastic of Delhi, he suggested to us that we should look for a plot of land for setting up a centre of our own, because we used to organize many Renewal events in the Archdiocese. This came as a confirmation of the message I had received earlier. After a considerable search, we found a piece of agricultural land with eggplant cultivation measuring about five hectares on the outskirts of New Delhi. In prayer, the Lord gave us confirmation for purchasing that plot of land. With personal contributions and a heavy bank loan, the Delhi Service Team managed to acquire the land in 2001.

There was a serious impediment coming in the way of using the land for construction of a renewal centre. Because the land was being used for agricultural purposes, the land laws would not permit its conversion and use for any other purpose. Hence, initially, we constructed only a small structure with an adoration chapel. It was christened as Jeevan Jyoti Ashram (a Centre of the Light of Life). Twenty-four hour adoration and intercession commenced in the chapel. "Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need" (Heb 4:16). The Lord prompted us to buy the land and then we witnessed His powerful intervention. In 2009, the local government published a new Master Plan for the city that converted the zoning for the whole area surrounding our centre into freehold land meant for construction of commercial buildings and residential houses. Subsequently, to our surprise, in 2011, the government released a plan for a highway that would run next to the centre.

Today, the facility can house about 150 people for retreats and training courses. Three priests and a few volunteers are available for full time ministry at the centre. There are regular retreats, night vigils, training programs, and gatherings offered at the centre. "Ask of me, and I will make the nations your heritage, and the ends of the earth your possession" (Ps 2:8). Now, the centre has three perpetual adoration chapels where members of the Renewal and volunteer groups come to spend night and day in adoration and intercession. As the Psalmist says, "Some trust in chariots, and some in horses, but let us place our trust in the Lord, our God" (Ps 20:7). Jesus is worth taking the risk! "Commit your way to the Lord; trust in him, and he will act" (Ps 37:5)!

I have a sense that this attitude ought to guide as anew today: where human wisdom and experience end, the sovereign action of the Holy Spirit begins. And where people humbly make themselves available to God, they are not in His way and HE can do great things! So let us live in this humble attitude and expect great things!
